# Shipwreck

Recommended year group: Year 2

Theme focus: Geography

Suggested term: Summer



#### Theme introduction

Shipwreck is a geography-based theme that is centred around the seas and oceans of the world. In this theme, pupils will also cover other subjects including history, PSHE, and design and technology. The theme begins with learning about ships and the role they play in every society. Pupils will progress through the theme by learning about famous sea explorers, compass directions, famous ships from history and key shipwrecks that exist around the UK coastline. The theme concludes with pupils building shelters for Robinson Crusoe and, finally, learning about the importance of the coastguard and the Royal National Lifeboat Institute (RNLI).

# **Essential knowledge/concepts**

- 1. The four capital cities in the UK are London, Cardiff, Belfast and Edinburgh.
- 2. The seas and oceans that surround the UK are English Channel, North Sea, Irish Sea, Celtic Sea and Atlantic Ocean.
- 3. The seven continents of the world are Asia, Africa, North America, South America, Antarctica, Europe and Australia.
- 4. The five oceans of the world are Arctic Ocean, Atlantic Ocean, Indian Ocean, Pacific Ocean and Southern Ocean.
- 5. The points of the compass are North, South, East and West.
- 6. Some key explorers are Christopher Columbus, Captain Cook, Marco Polo, Sir Francis Drake, Sir Walter Raleigh and Ellen MacArthur.
- 7. Christopher Columbus set sail on 3 August 1492 with three ships: the Niña, the Pinta and the Santa Maria.
- 8. Ellen MacArthur circumnavigated the world in 2005 in a record time.
- 9. A shipwreck is the destruction of a ship at sea by sinking or breaking up.
- 10. Coastlines are formed through the process of erosion.
- 11. Morse code is a series of dots and dashes that are used to create a message.
- 12. Access to the coastguard and the RNLI can be obtained by ringing 999.
